Dear Wesley Alumni, Family, and Friends:

When I wrote this letter to you in the Spring of 2020, I never thought that what I wrote in it would still be the same today! First, I pray that each of you are doing well. I pray that you have been healthy and safe during this pandemic. I also understand that there is a large likelihood that you have impacted greatly by COVID-19, so I pray that the grace of love of Jesus will be felt in your life now more than ever. During the Advent Season we, as Christians, sit in the expectant hope that the Messiah brings. As we live in the time of waiting; waiting for a vaccine, waiting for the opportunity to be in community again, and waiting for some semblance of routine, I pray that you may find hope!

In the midst of the challenges, frustrations, and fears, it is the hope that I have experienced over these past 9 months from doing ministry with the students at Wesley that has carried me through. Working within our discipleship system of Discover, Connect, Equip, and Send, our Core Ministry Team sought new strategies to engage our students in meaningful and fruitful ministries and dialogues. Our GroupMe became extremely active while students created more and more groups to chat and share pictures like our “Daily Dose of Pets” to bring a little joy to everyone’s day or “Arts and Crafts” to share fun ways to bypass extra time. We had students connecting online via zoom to play games or just hang out and we collaborated with Arise Campus Ministry at George Mason for podcasts and trivia nights. Knowing that we wouldn’t have the opportunity to discover new students in the fall in the same ways as usual, we reached out in early May to get names of students coming to VT so that we could send Wesley swag and notes, connect them to our summer small groups and allow them to find community prior to coming to campus since it would be hard to do so when they arrived. In a time when engagement with each other seemed impossible, our students found a way to remain connected with one another and grow in their relationships.

This fall has been very different, but with a purposeful social media campaign and lots of creative ways to engage with students, Wesley has continued to be in ministry on campus in meaningful ways. From “Cake in a Mug” tabling on campus to reach new students to 1 on 1 interest meetings, our Outreach Team found new ways to let people know about our ministries at Wesley! We have over 40 students engaged in our Communities of Grace (small groups), our food pantry (209 Marketplace) is providing food to over 15 students a week, students are tutoring Middle and High School students twice a week at FUN143, we have online worship through YouTube, and we are providing safe fellowship opportunities weekly. Our Missions Team changed the way we collected cake mixes for the Montgomery County Christmas Store and were able to collect over 1000 cake mixes for the first time in years by a concerted effort on social media and connecting with other clubs/organizations on campus. We have 14 students meeting 1 on 1 as Spiritual Formation Partners each week to grow in their faith and hold each other accountable. Wesley continues to “Love Out Loud” on the campus at Virginia Tech while adapting to the new context we find ourselves in right now.

As you can imagine, Wesley has been a refuge for so many students during the pandemic. I have countless stories of students who have said that without Wesley during this time they don’t know where they would be. We have had students engage with us in ministry because we are a safe place that is taking precautions with regard to COVID. The Wesley community has been the only bright spot in a very dark and scary semester for many.

It is for these, and many more reasons, that the students at Wesley have brought forth hope during this crazy season. And this is also why I sit in the expectant hope of what else is possible for our ministry at Wesley in the future. There are lots of things to be hopeful about; a campaign to help increase our capacity to do ministry, building construction projects like new resident rooms, and new adaptive ministries to reach new students.

None of this would be possible without you; both in the past and as we move into the future! Your generous and loving support enables us to be a ministry on Virginia Tech's campus that allows students to grow in their faith, create relationships that last a lifetime, and develop as leaders.

We need your support now more than ever! So we also ask that you consider supporting the ministries of Wesley in the following ways as we live into our vision "to be a grace filled community where all people feel safe and supported in their journey to explore and grow in their faith and their relationships with each other without condition or preconceived notions. We strive to develop and send out all people as peacemakers and disciples in the world rooted in faith and the relationships they build in our community."



Worship


Emily Anne: Worship Minister

Then, in the fall, we decided to take a step back and focus on what missions Wesley was called to participate in. The biggest focus was on Fun143, our weekly tutoring program for middle and high schoolers, as these students were left without mentors and normal face-to-face contact since March. We were able to spend two days a week with the kids throughout the semester! 209 has also continued amid the pandemic and has even grown and partnered with new organizations.

As a mission day this semester, we completed two benches that now sit outside of the Wesley building. Influenced by our reconciling statement and our current focus on social justice, one bench was painted to resemble the pride flag while the other features the words "black lives matter", along with the fist logo. We hope that these continue to be symbols of what Wesley stands for in the years to come.

Arguably our biggest success of the semester was our annual cake mix collection for the Montgomery county Christmas store. Usually, students stand outside of the local Krogers, asking patrons to purchase cake mixes to donate. As this could not happen with COVID regulations, we moved the collection to an online GoFundMe. We were able to raise about \$1400, which allowed us to purchase over 1000 cake mixes for the store! When we dropped them off, the volunteers told us that this year, every family would be able to take at least one box, with the larger families able to take multiple. Thank you to everyone who donated!



Prayer Chapel Renovations

This little project came about when I wanted to do a prayerful painting activity with my CoG and wanted the sacred space to be a little neater than it was. Additionally, our Prayer Chapel is used by so many students for a variety of reasons, and so I found a need to make this space less cluttered and more grounding. A safe space where one feels safe and comfortable in the physical environment and aesthetics around them, if you will. With the help of my friends Matthew Shealy and Skyler Bauman, the prayer

chapel became a much tidier and welcoming space! We removed all the furniture from the room and relocated the prayer kneeler to open up the space around the prayer shelf along the back wall. We vacuumed the floor and reorganized the furniture, creating a little nook in the corner and an overall more conversational layout in the room. We also organized the painting corner and brought in some thin wooden boards for people to place in the floor and paint

over. This is in hopes of avoiding paint spills on the carpet. We also ran a string of lights across the back floor against the wall, illuminating the reading nook and the prayer shelf. All the prayer chapel's artwork has been carefully displayed along the walls or hanging from the ceiling.

We are very excited with how the chapel looks now and are very grateful for our sacred, little space. This tidying up is just in time for our upcoming 24 hour prayer vigil, happening on Reading Day, December 10th. COG Update

Communities of Grace, also called CoGs, are Wesley's small groups. Through keeping students connected to one another, providing a safe and welcoming environment to discuss all sorts of questions, and allowing each group to grow in faith in unique ways, CoGs are integral to our ministry. The opportunities CoGs provide are a critical part of faith development, so ensuring that they continued throughout COVID-19 was a huge focus. With 9 CoGs lined up for the semester (including affinity groups for LGBTQ+ students, graduate students and freshmen), maintaining the quality of discussion and community that CoGs had provided in the past isn't as easy as sending everything onto Zoom.

Wesley's team-based approach to leadership shone brightly over the summer as we planned for a Fall semester unlike any we have seen so far. The



Healthy Church Team was able to quickly establish guidelines to keep students safe while still allowing use of our character-filled building, which let CoG leaders create plans before the semester started to minimize the transmission of COVID while maximizing community and spiritual growth at Wesley. Each CoG leader has taken this in a different way that suits their leadership style, whether that involves in-person meetings, Zoom meetings, or a mix of both. While the new restrictions limited some of the activities CoGs used to do in person, leaders have come up with all sorts of new ways to share time together.

Whether groups are carving pumpkins while socially distanced in the MPR, Zooming and using a Google Doc to analyze scripture together, or playing Among Us, CoGs have remained a critical part of life at Wesley. Engaging over 40 students per week, there are more students connected with CoGs than in any recent semester, a testament to how much students value maintaining community during a primarily virtual semester.



Fun143

COVID-19 caused a lot of unknowns for the future of the Fun143 program. However, after careful planning with BUMC and Bret, BUMC's Health Church Team approved the continuation of the Fun 143 tutoring program as long as Wesley students and participants followed COVID-19 safety precautions. Some of those precautions included (but were not limited to): social distancing within the building, wearing masks at all time, temperature checks upon arrival, hand sanitizing, filling out the UMC Health Acknowledgement Form, no food or drink, and opening windows for fresh air. We started out by tutoring on Thursdays from six to seven in the evenings. After a few sessions, it was clear that the kids needed an extra session to make sure they could get all of their schoolwork done, so we began tutoring on both Tuesday and Thursday evenings.



Most of the kids that we worked with either had a half online school schedule or were completely online, so it was a group effort to hold each other accountable for missing work, low grades, and a positive attitude. Between COVID-19 and the election, the fall semester was a complicated time for

everyone in the Fun 143 family. In order to maintain a healthy classroom environment in such uncertain times, Wesley tutors strived to maintain a mentorship relationship with the kids. One of the ways that the Wesley tutors built a relationship with the kids was by making Halloween gift bags with prepackaged candy, hand sanitizer, masks, and Chapstick. The kids were incredibly grateful for the treats and the effort we put into making them. By the end of our time with the kids (we ended Fun143 right before Thanksgiving break), Wesley tutors were extraordinarily proud of the kids' hard work in completing assignments, making-up missing work, and maintaining a positive attitude despite the challenges of online school. We look forward to future tutoring sessions in the spring.

209 Marketplace

This semester has been an exciting one for Wesley's in-house food pantry. For starters, we have officially changed our name to 209 Marketplace at Virginia Tech. We hope that this new name will allow us to reach students with food insecurities. We have continued our mission of providing food and necessities for Virginia tech students in need. During this semester, as many classes were held online and many students are out of jobs, the goods provided by 209 have become even more essential for our community. This has not been a solo effort; we have continued to receive help from NLCF (New Life Christian Fellowship) and

APO (a service fraternity) both of which have taken up the responsibility of running the pantry on different days during the week.

Another interesting thing 209 has done is that we are offering our first ever Thanksgiving dinner. Individuals who utilize the pantry were able to sign up to receive a precooked Thanksgiving dinner for them and their family. As we continue into the spring semester, we are looking forward to new partnerships that will better enable us to better reach those in need and to be a welcoming place for those we serve.
